Following our Annual Parish Council Meeting in May Colin Gamble stepped down as our Parish Council Chairman and will continue to serve as a councillor. On behalf of the village and your council colleagues thank you Colin for your leadership and dedication.

I was very fortunate to be elected as the incoming Chairwoman and look forward to representing you all and our great village. I've lived in the village since 2015 and have always been impressed with the excellent community groups offering a wide range of amenities, Langtoft is certainly a hub of activity which also benefits from the support of local businesses and of course the Parish Council.

I'd like to say a few words about our Parish Council and the role we play in the community.

Parish News.

As a statutory government body, we're integral to what makes our village a great place to be. The council represents your interests in improving the quality of life and local environment. Furthermore, we can influence other decision makers and can in many cases, deliver services to meet local needs. In other word's your Parish Council does make a difference.

Some of the areas we're accountable for and/or review on behalf of the village: community safety, seats and shelters, park's, cemetery, planning and highways, A major focus is to ensure we leverage local grants and funding in support of improving village amenities and large-scale maintenance.

Over the last 12 months to date we have secured funding for restoration of East End Park. Undertaken tree preservation work at the park, cemetery, and Penfield received a donation for Penfield wheelchair accessible viewing platform and wildlife information boards. Provided outdoor adult gym equipment in both East and West end parks.

We have seven elected councillors and a Clerk all with varied backgrounds and experience which enables us to represent our village across a wide range of council accountabilities and to ensure we remain proactive in promoting the interests and wellbeing of the people of Langtoft. Currently we have four open vacancies, so if you're passionate about your community why not join us.

As we move into the Autumn months we'll share more insights into our Parish Council work, events, and engagement with the village community.

There is an open invitation to come along to our Parish Council meetings. They are public meetings, and we welcome you to all to come along not only to see what we are doing but to get involved as a community volunteer.

Dear Residents,

As your district councillors, we are grateful to the editorial team for putting together this Parish Magazine. If you are able to support the Parish Council with this then please let them know. Your contribution towards our community would be much appreciated.

We hope you have had a wonderful summer and found some time to relax and recharge.

From 16th September SKDC will be offering kerbside collection of batteries and single use vapes. These can be left in a clear plastic bag next to the wheelie bin every week. It is hoped this new measure will reduce fires in bin lorries and recycling centres which can occur when batteries are crushed or damaged when they are inappropriately put into wheelie bins. Batteries can still be recycled at retail outlets as before.

Since the role out of the separate paper and card recycling in February only 1% of this has been contaminated. This is excellent news as it provides high quality recyclate. The silver bin contamination rate has also improved.

The Anglian Water consultation on the new reservoir near Sleaford, with a pipe to Peterborough which will pass near Langtoft has now closed. www.lincreservoir.co.uk This is in addition to the Grantham to Bexwell pipeline which has been delayed for various reasons.

LCC has recently opened a consultation on its minerals and waste plan which includes changes to the site at West Deeping: www.lincolnshire.gov.uk/planning/minerals-waste This runs until 24th September.

With the changes in Westminster we have also seen the approval of the Mallard Pass Solar Farm. We understand that this is disappointed to many residents who have concerns about its direct local impact as well as the detrimental effect that it may have on our country's food production.

We both attend most Parish Council meetings and are committed to serving the needs of our community and speaking up for residents. If you have any concerns, suggestions, or feedback, please do not hesitate to reach out to us. Thank you for your ongoing support.

I recently had the pleasure of getting Liz to sit still for an hour or so on behalf of us all so I could find out what drives her passion and commitment to volunteering and supporting our community.

For those of you who have not met her yet! Liz has lived in Langtoft for some 14 years, however, local to the area for 55 years. She has two daughters and four grandchildren and an avid gardener. Now you would think that would keep her busy, yet she finds time, has endless energy and a passion for helping others and the community in general.

One of her greatest accomplishments is the annual Langtoft Festival. Started in 2019 an idea Liz had whilst driving home one evening and seeing another village advertising their festival. The inaugural festival in 2019 had a wide spectrum of music from a military band to gospel singers and has become a regular entertainment event for people in the village and the surrounding area ever since. Furthermore over £3000 in donations have been made by the Festival Committee to local needs.

Liz is also the Chair of the Village Hall Committee, a volunteer for the Deepings men's Group and a member of the Deepings Practice Car scheme. Liz said the car scheme is desperate for more volunteer drivers and anyone that has a few hours to spare could they please call the coordinators on 07858373912. Liz has met some lovely people doing this volunteering and they are all so appreciative that it's a real pleasure to do it.

I asked Liz what she personally gained from her volunteering work. She replied that she calls it 'Pay forward', supporting others like she would want to be. She says the best part is meeting so many different people, sitting back watching people enjoying themselves and being able to help someone with day-to-day tasks. Her advice for people considering supporting the community is to 'Just Do It' don't think about it too much, look around your community, see what the needs are and get involved you'll surprise yourself.

Penfield Volunteer! Langtoft meets Augy Harrison



Augy is known to many in the village as a keen naturalist and the main working party team leader for Penfield Nature Reserve.

His passion for wildlife started early; his childhood home in Bath backed onto the Kennet and Avon canal and open countryside so he was exposed to nature from his early years. A love and knowledge of butterflies and moths specifically, has grown enormously from trying to hatch butterflies from caterpillars as a child.

On leaving school he worked on the railway as a trainee driver, retrained as a carpenter then developed an interest in engineering through modifying motorcycles for drag racing. He then took an engineering degree and came to work for Perkins in 2000, moving to Langtoft in 2014.

He joined the management group for Penfield Nature Reserve back in 2018. The Parish Council's takeover of Penfield in May 2021 coincided perfectly with his retirement, freeing him to join, and often lead, the regular Wednesday morning working parties. His carpentry skills have also proved an asset to the volunteer group, with the site being improved with benches, bird boxes (assembled by Langtoft Primary School children) and a sand martin box.

Thanks to some external funding, the volunteer team has just been installing some direction signage, and Augy has advised on more exciting developments to follow (wildlife identification boards and creation of some disabled access to the site).

Augy commented that volunteering has not only been extremely rewarding, it has had many benefits he had not anticipated. Seeing and learning about the varied wildlife that use Penfield, the exercise, working outdoors close to nature, and especially the camaraderie of working with the regular volunteers; it has become a semi social event on Wednesday mornings

Langtoft Festival

Langtoft Festival came about after my retirement in 2017. I was looking for a project and one day I was driving along the A1 and saw a notice for Water Newton Beer Festival. I thought Bourne has the beer festival and Baston has the Blitz and the car show. Market Deeping has the raft race and the duck race, but Langtoft in between, has nothing.

Being an impulsive Aries I went home, picked a date, 13th of July; my beloved sister's birthday and advertised the fact that we would be having a festival on that date in 2019.

It did not occur to me to ask if the village, in fact, wanted such an event! But I am renowned for running with an idea without any true idea of just how much work and money would be needed! A committee was formed with local residents and so it began.

Funding from SKDC community fund kindly supplied nearly £5000 in grant money to start us off. Local companies and businesses put their faith in this new enterprise and sponsored the venture. We have been funded by local sponsorship ever since then and have greatly appreciated this.

2019 Festival (our first) had two stages. 17 bands from a full Highland pipe band to a Gospel Choir. The night before the Festival, we had a show with Luke Carver Goss and Ian McMillan. Two well-known gentlemen who entertained us royally with music, poems, and comedy. Sadly, a huge storm came in that night, torrential rain and high winds destroyed the gazebos and marquees that we had erected ready for the Festival. This was a devastating blow. However, true to form the residents of Langtoft rallied round. They turned up with their gazebos to replace those lost and saved the day! This is what community spirit truly is. The sun shone for us on the Saturday, and it was a great success. A lot was learnt that first year and we had SO much support and advice from SKDC, the Baston Car show organisers and many others. I must have driven them all quite mad with my questions! Thank you all!

Langtoft Festival

COVID meant that we did not have a 2020 Festival. But we managed another very enjoyable Festival in 2021.

In 2022 our Festival was sadly cancelled at the very last minute. This was because we allowed an external group to take over the organising, as a learning exercise for their students. But, due to poor management, they failed. It had been outsourced to give myself and Diane a break.

This could have effectively killed the Festival in the water, but we were determined not to let that happen. So, in 2023 Diane Valentine and I set about restoring the village's faith in us. Although it was hard, with some doubting we would be able to

pull it off, we did!

2024 was our fourth festival and each year we try to add something new - 2023 saw the introduction of a dog show, Viking display, children's activities and much more. 2024, Classic cars and motorcycles were added along with displays from local groups.

Natalie Stygall joined the team in 2024 and did a fantastic job with our social media, this appeared to be done by myself on Facebook (haha) but it was all Natalie's work.

Once having covered our costs we have been able to give back to our local community in the form of contributions to the council for our local park, Penfield Nature Reserve noticeboard, Langtoft Football Club for equipment and Langtoft Church for the Roof repair fund. We have also supported many charities.

Already the date has been set for Festival 2025 - 5th of July. I have decided to step back from the organising now. The festival is well established, and it is time for others to take the reins. I will be staying on as an advisor and I know the future of Langtoft Festival will be safe in the hands of the new committee.

An extra special thank you must go to all our wonderful volunteers, it would not be possible to stage this village event without them!

Nature Watch.

East End Pond.

As I write, we still have a pool of water left in the pond where all the remaining newts and pond life have congregated. Hopefully sufficient water will remain long enough for the Efts (baby newts) to mature and colonise the surrounding land.

In August, we contracted with Mick Thwaites, a specialist in using traditional materials, to provide a knee high cleaved chestnut fence to segment the pond from the children's play area. The objective was to provide a barrier to prevent pre-school age children from running directly into the pond whilst at the same time, providing an attractive addition to the park. He did a fabulous job which seems to have been well received by the community.

During September we will be pollarding some more of the self-set willows from the pond basin. Following this we hope to get an excavator on site to reshape the pond basin creating a mosaic of deeper and shallower areas by shifting some of the silt onto the banksides. We hope that by doing this work, we will improve the aquatic habitat by retaining water in the pond for a longer period during the summer.

It's worth mentioning that the costs of the pond restoration are primarily being met by a generous grant from the Augean Community Fund. Grants are made to community groups wishing to make environmental improvements to public amenities, biodiversity and conservation or heritage projects within a 10 mile radius of the Augean Kings Cliffe landfill operation.

Nature Watch.

Penfield Nature Reserve.

Having had a very successful open day in June we were very upbeat and delighted with the feedback that we got about the reserve from the people who came. And then... The vandals struck, damaging trees and saplings down the pathways and writing graffiti on the WI bench and on the gate to the lower path. We managed to rectify the damage in good time and have also sanded down and re-treated the bench and the gate so the traces of the graffiti are gone.

We are sure that our Bittern nested this year, they are very secretive, but ours certainly changed his booming tune in May, which indicated that he had found a mate.

There has been a lot of activity by sand martins around the nesting box that we erected for them last year. They generally have 2 broods of chicks per year, so if they do nest they will be here for most of the summer.

The very wet, cold spring this year seems to have caused havoc with the butterfly, moth and bee populations and it also caused us to cancel a day visit by Langtoft Primary School.

Of the few butterfly species that we have seen the less common are the Green Hairstreak and the Dingy Skipper (small brown butterfly). The moth count has been low although we have managed to record a small variety including our favourite Poplar Hawk Moth and the giant Privet Hawk moth.

Our Wildlife photographer has recorded many of our resident creatures, including Hare, Muntjack, Roe Deer, Badgers, Coots, stoat, the Bittern and other wildfowl, including visiting Otters.

We are very fortunate to have been granted some funds from Public sources which will allow us to lay a path from the main gate and create a viewing area (overlooking the bird feeders) to allow access to Wheelchair, pushchair and other visitors requiring a firm base. We expect this to be completed by the end of the year.

Recent visitors will have seen that we have erected some way markers recently to make it easier to navigate around the reserve. We are also hoping to provide some information boards showing the birds, insects and mammals that use the reserve.

This coming autumn, we are planning to build a newt pond close to the main pond, with the aim of encouraging newts and other amphibians into it, for easy and safe viewing by visitors.

from Bread + Cheese to Brodsworth Hall, by Sue Eales

One of the great strengths of our WI is in the variety of speakers and activities that we offer our members. Over the last few months, we have had talks about the Lincolnshire Emergency Blood Bikes Service, 'The Wonderful, Wicked Wallis Simpson', Bread + Cheese and 'A storm in a Teashop!' We have also had the opportunity to visit Brodsworth Hall as guests of Dyke WI, been to see the ballet at Peterborough New Theatre, as well as attending meetings held by other local WIs.

Lincolnshire Emergency Blood Bikes Service (LEBBS)

LEBBS takes medical products around the county out of hours, free of charge for the NHS, saving £100,000s. They will carry anything of an urgent, medical nature that can fit on a motorcycle, but, unlike emergency vehicles, they are not allowed to break the speed limit. The motorbikes are owned by the charity and they also have 4 wheel drive vehicles for use in icy weather – all driven by volunteers who must be over 25 and have an advanced driving qualification. They have also been taking blood and plasma to the Air Ambulance since 2017. In 2023, there were 2080 runs in Lincolnshire, plus 559 trips to the air ambulance.

Following the talk, our members very generously donated more than £185 towards the running costs of LEBBS.



The Wonderful, Wicked Wallis Simpson!

This was a very lively talk that challenged some of the misconceptions about this intriguing woman. Wallis was certainly sophisticated, fashion conscious and ambitious and she enjoyed the attention of the handsome Prince of Wales. There is no doubt about that. However, our speaker revealed that Wallis was not prepared for his infatuation and obsession with her, and was unwilling to divorce her husband, even when Edward threatened to cut his own throat if she didn't join him at Balmoral. Their liaison was common gossip all over the USA and Europe and Wallis had to put up with death threats and bricks thrown through her windows. Eventually she gave in to Edward's demands to get engaged and he bought her a large emerald and diamond ring – one of many jewels he bestowed upon her. In the end, their devotion to each other lasted a lifetime and, on Wallis' death, she left all her jewellery to French medical research charities as a thank you to the French people for giving them a home.

A Storm in a Teashop!

This was a story about a group of very strong-minded, brave and dignified women who, in 1908, were unwilling to put up with working conditions as waitresses at the Cabin restaurant in London's Piccadilly and went on strike. No books, archives or articles exist about this fascinating story, but there were plenty of newspaper articles about it at the time. It is only recently that these have been made available online for research and our speaker, Dr Ann Featherstone, was able to take advantage of this resource to uncover this otherwise forgotten episode in women's social history. It was very early days for photojournalism and therefore, not many photographs exist; and those that Dr Featherstone found were quite grainy and poor quality. However, through characterisation and great storytelling skill, she brought the characters to life and drew us into the story of these formidable "Cabin Girls" who not only took their employer to court, but also succeeded in obtaining backing from many influential people (men and women) and opened their own teashop on Brompton Road, opposite Harrods. The stories of normal women throughout history have been so readily forgotten, so it was satisfying to think that the efforts of these admirable women have now been brought to light.

The Bayeux Tapestry at Thurlby WI

Five ladies from Langtoft attended Thurlby WI's meeting in June, where the speaker was Mia Hansson who is creating an exact replica of the Bayeux Tapestry – errors and all – which she aims to complete by 2027. She brought two completed, 10 metre lengths for us to look at, as well as samples of the wool she is using and work in progress. Whilst working on the tapestry and studying the original in so much detail, Mia has been able to identify how the ladies must have worked in the time just after 1066. For example, on some parts you can see that the chain stitches are upside down on the top half of the section and the right way up on the bottom half. This means that the original embroiderers must have been sitting at a long bench, working opposite each other.

Mia has captured the attention of the keepers of the original tapestry in Bayeux, who have asked her to draw up a sketch of her ideas for the missing end section for their consideration. So who knows, she might have some moreork to do when this is finished! Mia has a very active Facebook page in which she shares every detail of her amazing project with anyone who is interested.

Seed and fertilizer is spread and falls into the grooves/holes created and we then spread and level a top dressing across the whole green. We then keep it moist until germination of the seed and subsequent growth, before the frosts and winter usually arrive in November.
