### Managing East End Park and Black Bull Green

- Regular litter picking around the centre of the village by the gardener

- Administration including booking of plots, liaising with resident, bereaved, undertakers and stone masons and marking out plots for burial

## Penfield Nature Reserve.

Its spring again and Penfield like our gardens at home is waking up from its winter sleep. The trees and flowers are in bud and the reserve is looking green again after 4 months of grey/brown hue.

That's not to say that nothing has been going on, the volunteers have been very busy, clearing paths, erecting dead hedging, pulling up self set saplings and doing our best to stabilise the paths using gravel that we "borrowed back" courtesy of Hanson's quarry at the end of Outgoing road.

The bird feeders at the reserve continue to attract blue tits, great tits, long tailed tits, gold finches, a family of robins, the squirrel and we have filmed several deer eating the peanuts that have fallen to the floor. The bittern is back it was heard booming in the last week, and a number of swans, coots, moorhens and ducks have over wintered on the large lake. A keen birder spotted a Firecrest last week and we understand we are right at the edge of their range. We cleaned out the Sand Martin box in the new year, it was unused last year but there have been sightings of the sand martins down at Deeping lakes already so we are hopeful this year. 18 out of 19 of the bird boxes that the Langtoft primary school constructed in 2022 were used for nesting which is a fantastic result.

Larger animals such as roe deer, muntjac, hares, rabbits and an otter family have all been spotted at the reserve and filmed footage of these animals and many of the birds, butterflies, moths and flowers have formed the basis of the many presentations that we have given to WI, Mothers Union and other groups.

The open day this year is planned for Saturday 8th June and with luck we will exceed the 50 or so visitors that we had last year.

We are working with the Langtoft Primary School and are planning 3 activities (pond dipping, bug house analysis and moth traps) for the year 6 pupils to have an out of school field trip at the end of May We have been very fortunate to have secured some funding that should allow us to build the long planned and awaited viewing gallery and provide a number of way markers and information boards around the reserve.

Many thanks to David, a villager who turned up at the reserve and presented us with 2 bat boxes, these will be put up in the next few weeks and it will be interesting to see what use they get as we know that there are at least 3 species of bat that visit the reserve.

Continued thanks to the growing number of volunteers who turn out to help with the work on site. We are all of a certain age and would love to encourage younger participation if we can. If any one would like to help out the Penfield team, either as an on site volunteer or as part of the management team, please email <u>clerk@langtoftparishcouncil.org</u> and we will be in touch. On site work parties usually take place on Wednesday mornings from 09:30 to 12:30 and occasionally on Saturdays too. Children under 16 are welcome but must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

### Langtoft WI

### **By Sue Eales**

A lot has been happening at Langtoft WI since our last Grapevine article. Here is a report of two of our most recent talks.

### A Journey Helping Ukrainian People

Langtoft WI was delighted when two volunteers who deliver aid to Ukraine agreed to tell us about the impact that the donations we make have on the lives of ordinary people living in terrifying conditions. Will Thompson and Justin Tilley have so far received over £250,000 in donations, have made 14 trips to Poland with 50 tonnes of food and other supplies plus more than 40 generators, 1000s of torches and batteries and, in November 2023, they travelled with two ambulances and several vans, leaving them behind for Ukrainian people to use. They also delivered more than 600 gift boxes for Christmas, some of which were donated by Langtoft WI members. Some of the money has been spent on summer camps for children, giving them respite and psychological support. They have even introduced the game of cricket to Ukrainian people!

For Justin and Will, this is all about communities coming together to help other communities in need. They stressed the importance of making it personal, using photographs to ensure that communities in Ukraine know that people like them in UK are thinking of them. Similarly, people in the UK know that whatever they make/donate is going to someone like them.

Sometimes emotional, with the speakers almost in tears at times, this was Justin and Will's first presentation and our members and guests were captivated by their story.

### Professor Sir Jonathan Van Tam Kt. MBE, DM, FMedSci

The guest speaker at our Federation Annual Meeting in March was none other than Professor Sir Jonathan Van Tam, who everyone will remember from the Covid briefings during 2020, 2021 and into 2022.

Sir Jonathan explained his background. He told us that he had been told at university to be authentic, remember your roots and stay in touch with the people you serve. This he has always striven to do. He always remembers that communication is how well you are understood, not how well you speak. Sir Jonathan then talked about the progress of the Coronavirus and the increasing knowledge and data available at the time, but he admitted that communicating the unknown to the public was extremely difficult.

There was an evolution from social intervention, ie "stay at home" and "social distancing" to medical intervention, ie the vaccination programme. Sir Jonathan explained that, at some point during a conversation between him and Sir Patrick Vallance, the idea of a 'Vaccine Task Force' was mooted. They were both adamant that the task force should have ring-fenced money and should be left alone to take calculated risks, setting its own priorities outside government. When they approached the Prime Minister, they found that he had an appetite for risk and a Venture Capitalist was recruited to lead the task force. This turned out to be the correct decision and the task force was empowered to buy into vaccine development with no guarantees. The MRHA (Medicines & Healthcare products Regulatory Agency) waived its normal strict rules, allowing the vaccine research data to be sent to them as it came in whatever format without having to worry about correct page numbering etc, which also played a large part in making the vaccines available as quickly as possible.

Sir Jonathan talked us through a typical Downing Street briefing day from getting the call 24 hours prior to the briefing, making preparations on the train to London, having a cup of tea with Larry, the cat at 10 Downing Street and standing on a box at the podium as he is not very tall. Finally, he gave us some of the lessons he learned as a leading expert during the pandemic – don't panic, don't clutch at straws, take calculated risks, always speak the truth to power, reserve the right to speak independently, choose battles carefully, begin with the end in mind, plan fall back positions and set red lines. It was an honour and a privilege to be in the presence of such an influential person whose decisions affected all our lives and a long standing ovation was received calmly and humbly by Professor Sir Jonathan Van Tam.

### **Easter Church Window Decorations**

As usual, members of Langtoft WI decorated our church windows for easter. We used paper flowers, pom poms, eggs, birds and bunnies. I am sure you will agree that the end result was colourful and cheerful.

## East End Pond – Restoration

Following one of the wettest winters on record, the pond has been at its fullest for several years. Water started to appear in late October and

gradually rose until it peaked at about 1.5m deep. The water level will now continue to decrease as we get drier weather and the underlying ground water levels fall.

Stage 1 pollarding of the self-set willows in the pond basin was carried out at the beginning of October. Brash was chipped and removed from site to



go for biomass fuel. As part of the improvements to wildlife habitat, the pollarded timber was used to create a log pile and stag beetle pyramid. Various information boards have been placed around the pond to illustrate how these habitats can be created in your own garden.



New colourful stems have already started to sprout from the pollarded willows. With regular pollarding, a new crown will be formed and the trees will resemble the shorter stubbier willows typically associated with a Fenland landscape. As in this picture taken along the Whittlesey Wash.

As to the wildlife, ducks have been present and newts should be arriving into the pond ready to breed. We also have blue tits in the nest boxes.

#### THE HYDE & MOSSOP CHARITY

#### **Registered Charity No. 24668**

The Charity of Rev John Mossop and Rachel Hyde has been in existence for a long time. The Rachel Hyde Charity was founded in 1707. This involved four cottages in Sutton St Mary being left to the village, the rents to be used for educational purposes. (Two cottages unaccounted for). The remaining two cottages were sold in 1944 with the money being invested in Treasury Stocks the interest from which was drawn annually.

The Rev. John Mossop Charity was founded in 1833 in which a three-acre field situated along Cross Road Langtoft was left to the Parishes of Langtoft and Baston. The yearly rent is shared equally between the two villages.

The two Charities were merged in 1892 and registered with the Charity Commission. This new and amalgamated Charity was administered by four Trustees (now five). The original Trustees in 1892 were the Rev. Henry Holden, Mr. Henry Atter (Churchwarden), Mr. George Peasgood and Mr. Joseph Frank.

The money from the Charity was originally administered on St Thomas's Day. "Books were given as prizes to the children and gifts of cash to the poor and needy"

In the mid 1960's the position held by the Churchwarden was reviewed by the Charity Commission and it was decided the position should be held by two people nominated by the Parish Council, each for a four-year period. The other Trustees, the Vicar and two co-opted residents of Langtoft (each for a five year period), remained the same.

The current Trustees are: Rev Carolyn bailey, Mrs Debbie Hallam (Chair), Mrs Velma Denniston Mrs J Clingo, Mrs S Archer and Mrs Diane Valentine. The Clerk is Mrs Yvonne McCulloch

Now days the charity provides token gifts to the village school leavers (Y6) at the end of the summer term, token gifts to nominated (over 90) residents of Langtoft at Christmas and to those bereaved.

The money from the original 1944 sale of the cottages is now invested in fixed interest securities via Blackrock Charinco Fund for charities and the field is still let. The Charity has a small regular income from these investments but relies on donations from local organisations to maintain the level of gifts distributed.
