Dear Residents,

As the days begin to shorten the weather has certainly changed. Heavy rainfall has already caused some localised flooding. Please remember that Lincolnshire County Council is the lead flood authority (contact 01522 782082). The District Council will continue to support residents and direct enquires as appropriate. If you feel that your life is in danger or property is in immediate risk of flooding please ring 999 and ask for Fire Services.

We understand that for some the removal of the Winter Fuel Allowance may cause financial difficulty. At the September Council meeting a large majority of members supported the Leader of the Council in sending a letter to the Chancellor expressing concerns. SKDC is also carrying out targeted support by reaching out to pensioners to help assess their eligibility for pension credit claim as well as offering other forms of assistance. If you would like us to put you in touch with the council's Cost of Living Team then please get in touch.

The new battery kerbside collection which commenced in September has proved a great success. Please remember to place batteries in clear bags and leave on the top of your weekly bin collection. This was introduced to stop fires inside the bin lorries. It is hoped that the new service will soon also include the collection of disposable vapes.

Last month Cllr Vanessa Smith took part in the first Greatford Manor Farm Quarry Liaison Group meeting. This gives an opportunity to make sure all planning regulations are adhered to and residents a point of contact for raising their concerns. A date for commencement of work at the site is still to be confirmed.

SKDC is in the process of reviewing its Local Plan, this outlines site allocation for new housing and other land use. The change in government at Westminster may mean that more housing needs to be delivered throughout the District. Possibilities are being considered and a further consultation on the SKDC Local Plan is expected in new year.

We both attend most Parish Council meetings and are committed to serving the needs of our community and speaking up for residents. If you have any concerns, suggestions, or feedback, please do not hesitate to get in touch. Thank you for your ongoing support.

#### SAVE A LIFE – CPR AND DEFIBRILATOR TRAINING

Julian Witherington and his lovely assistant Sophie from SK Leisure came for the third time to the Langtoft Village Hall on Friday 4th October to give an extremely interesting talk with film, slide show and demonstrations on how to Save a Life by performing CPR and how to use a Defibrillator. The talk also covered Choking and Secondary Drowning. Secondary drowning is fortunately a rare occurrence but this training highlighted the fact that ANYONE who has "drowned" or been immersed and taken water into their lungs should ALWAYS see a doctor even though they have appeared to have made a full recovery

11 people attended and it was a delight to see two young men in this group, Benas Baukas 16 and Oliver Wheatstone 15, ..... Let's see if we can encourage more to the next one!

At intervals during the talk the attendees were able to practice on four dummies the various stages of attending someone who required CPR. The giving of CPR proved just how hard it is to maintain 30 compressions and 2 breathes but all present did admirably!

The talk then moved onto Defibrillator's and again after watching their use demonstrated by Sophie, all had a turn at the of how to use a defib safely from first finding an unconscious, not breathing person to the Ambulance arriving.

These training sessions are provided free of charge by Julian and his team from SK Leisure and are excellent. If anyone wishes to donate to enable them to continue with these sessions please use the following details.

#### Nature Watch.

#### East End Pond

This year, a small pool of water remained in the pond right up until mid August giving the newt tadpoles time to mature and leave the water to become air breathing land-based amphibians. They have now left the pond area and will spend autumn and winter in woodland, scrub and gardens often under logs or other debris. They reach sexual maturity at between two and four years of age at which point they return to ponds to breed. These two juveniles were seen hiding beneath one of the many rocks surrounding our pond and will now have journeyed further afield.

Further pollarding of the self-set willows took place during the later part of September which has really opened up vistas across the pond area. The brash was chipped and removed from site and village volunteers then moved the remaining timber, extending the existing log pile and creating an additional one.

September 2024 was the second wettest September on record for Lincolnshire and as a result, water levels in the pond have risen very early and quickly with approximately 3 feet of water currently in the pond. The planned silt excavation therefore had to be undertaken in wet conditions which was not ideal. However, deeper areas have been created which should mean water is retained in the pond for a longer period during the summer. In time the silt and soil which was deposited on the banksides, together with the pollarded willows, will green up restoring the attractiveness of the site.





#### Nature Watch.

#### **Penfield Nature Reserve**

The autumn is upon us so at the nature reserve we are busy doing much as everyone is doing at home. We are trimming, pruning and tidying ready for the baron season of winter. In order to try and be a little greener than last year, we have purchased a number of scythes and all the team have had scythe lessons and instructions on how to use them safely, which will save the fuel for the strimmers and the mower.

At long last we have agreed on a contractor to lay the path from the main gate and we expect work to start on the building works in the new year.

A team from Caterpillar in Peterborough came for a team building day and after a day of hard labour they have made a good start on the newt pond that we are planning to open next year.

We have many varieties of tits, finches, robins and other birds visiting the bird feeders at the moment and we will continue to feed them throughout the winter months.

One of our last activities to do this year will be to take down the nest boxes and clean out the Sand Martin nesting box to see and record what nesting success we have had.

Recent visitors will have noticed that we have erected some information boards at various locations around the reserve showing the birds, insects and mammals can be seen.

Our Wildlife photographer has recorded many of our resident creatures, including Hare, Muntjack, Roe Deer, Badgers, Coots, stoat, the Bittern and other wildfowl, including visiting Otters. On Thursday the 12th December the team will be giving a presentation at the village hall. This was a great success last year so please come along at 19:30 to see what we have discovered this year.

Continued thanks to the growing number of volunteers who turn out to help with the work on site. We are all of a certain age and would love to encourage younger participation if we can. If any one would like to help out the Penfield team, either as an on site volunteer or as part of the management team, please email clerk@langtoftparishcouncil.org and we will be in touch.

On site work parties usually take place on Wednesday mornings from 09:30 to 12:30 and occasionally on Saturdays too. Children under 16 are welcome but must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

#### Langtoft WI

Our WI takes a break in August. However, we were back in September with an interesting talk by the staff of Hotel Chocolat in Stamford who also brought a selection of delicious samples for us to try and showed us how to taste chocolate like a pro. We learned that Hotel Chocolat is an actual hotel in St Lucia, where they also have a farm. Because it takes 3-5 years for cacao trees to bear fruit, farmers are reluctant to grow them as a crop. Hotel Chocolat agreed to buy the whole crop at over the market rate to persuade farmers to grow cacao trees. Beans take on the flavour of the area in which they are grown, like wine, and every part of the fruit is used, including the shell, which is used in the hotel to infuse in tea and gin. The chocolates are all made in their factory in Huntingdon.

It was our pleasure this year to host the regional Hereward Meeting, which was also held in September. WI members from Baston, Deeping St James, Thurlby and Carlby joined us for an afternoon tea with speaker, Nicola Sandall, who gave us a lively talk on the lords and ladies of Stamford.

#### **Our Campaigns**

The WI plays a very important role in campaigning nationally for change in issues that affect women and girls as well as the wider community.

The Women's Institute is democratic and member-led, and our resolutions and campaigning process is unique in putting members at the heart of decisions about our campaign activity. Every issue that we campaign on stems directly from a resolution put forward by members meaning WI members have a unique opportunity to turn a concern into a national campaign every year, backed by the whole of the WI.



A resolution is a call for change on a current issue in society. Once a resolution has been adopted at the Annual Meeting, the Public Affairs Department turns it into a campaign. Through national and local campaigning, members play a key role in achieving change on important issues.

#### Clubs.

#### Langtoft WI

Over the last 100 years, WI members have campaigned on an incredible range of issues, increasing public awareness and bringing about real change. The very first WI resolution was passed in 1918 and called for a 'sufficient supply of convenient and sanitary houses, being of vital importance to women in the country'. In 1922 and 1924, two resolutions were passed calling for an increase in women police. With its roots in rural life, protection of the countryside has always been important to the WI and it was a resolution in 1954 that brought about one of the WI's most significant initiatives. This resolution called for a campaign to 'preserve the countryside against desecration by litter,' and subsequently led to the formation of the Keep Britain Tidy group. The WI was one of the several organisations who founded the Fairtrade Foundation in 1992.

In May 2023, the WI launched its Clean Rivers campaign to clean up rivers and promote bathing water status as a way to achieve this. Water quality in our rivers is shameful. Making, supporting and promoting applications for officially designated bathing sites on appropriate stretches of rivers will be instrumental to the clean-up of rivers as it has proved for water quality improvement at coastal beaches. The WI has joined the River Action UK body and signed its Charter for Rivers, calling on the government to commit to ambitious yet achievable actions for healthy rivers by 2030.

This year there were over 95,000 individual selections cast by WI members and the most popular resolution was Dental Health Matters. There is a chronic shortage of NHS Dentists and people are suffering health issues as a result. The WI calls on the Government to increase investment in the training and retention of dentists and to review the current inadequate NHS contracts to ensure everyone can access an NHS dentist wherever they live.
