Dear Resident.

Winter is fast approaching, and Christmas will soon be here.

There is still much uncertainty around Local Government. Westminster is moving ahead with plans for reorganisation, though details remain unclear. While residents have been invited to share their views, it appears final decisions on council mergers will be made centrally. We are as much in the dark as you! A new authority is expected to form in 2027, fully replacing SKDC and LCC in 2028. Until then, it is likely our current roles will continue.

SKDC is progressing with its Local Plan, which will remain valid after the merger. This plan identifies sites suitable for housing to meet government-set targets. The next consultation on this is expected in the new year.

We're pleased to see speed limits painted on roads and hope motorists observe them. Please drive carefully this winter—our roads can be hazardous due to ditches and black ice. Everyone's safety is important. A proposed quarry north of Baston (LCC PL/0070/23), coupled with increased house building, raises concerns about increased HGV and commuter traffic on the already dangerous A15 and its junctions. We'd like safer roads for all, including cyclists, to promote active travel and reduce car use. Please comment on the application if you have concerns.

As mentioned in our last update, food waste collection begins in April 2026, with caddies arriving in the new year. A reminder—SKDC collects batteries weekly at the kerbside for recycling. Place them in a sealed clear plastic bag on top of your bin.

It's been a dry year so far, but if average rainfall continues, we could see heavy rain soon. While Langtoft is at low flood risk, nearby villages have been affected by flooding. For internal flooding, call 999. For non-urgent help, contact the Environment Agency's Floodline at 0345 988 1188.

Please get in touch if we can help with anything. And we would like to wish you all the very best for the festive season.

A message from some of our Ukrainian Families

Russia invaded Ukraine on 24th February 2022. It is heartbreaking to think that the war in Ukraine is still raging. An estimated 14 million Ukrainians were displaced from their homes, with the UK taking in around 250,000 Ukrainians through various resettlement schemes. National funding to assist councils with housing refugees enabled SKDC to purchase twelve new homes in Langtoft for these families. In 2023 a group of residents and the Parish Council purchased hampers to welcome the new families to our village. Since then, families have settled in, with children attending local schools and people finding work in the area. Not everyone has stayed and as families move out houses will be filled from the Council's social housing register. A few of the residents have written into the Grapevine with a seasonal update.

Hello everyone! My name is Olga Okopna. My son Dima, our cat, and I moved to this wonderful village of Langtoft in September 2023. I was so happy when they called me and handed me the keys on my birthday in August – it was a real gift! I wanted to express my admiration for the beauty of this village, the welcoming neighbours, and this wonderful new, warm home.

I want to express my deepest gratitude to South Kesteven District Council for providing us with such a wonderful home. I'm so glad I'm not the only Ukrainian here; there are many Ukrainian families here, and we have our own community. It's wonderful that we've met British families and are able to connect.

I wanted to share my delight at celebrating Christmas in the UK, in Ukraine everything is so different. It's so nice to observe other traditions, and even better, to participate in them. Thank you to the British government and all the British people who welcomed us so warmly.





Greetings. My name is Larisa. I'd like to share some of our Ukrainian traditions with you. Holy Evening is my favourite festive dinner. It takes place on Christmas Eve. Twelve Lenten dishes are served. Kutia is a must. Varenyky, borscht, fish, compote and cabbage are also popular. Dinner begins with the appearance of the first star in the sky.

Kutia is a traditional Ukrainian Christmas Eve dish. It symbolizes unity, remembrance, and blessings for the new year. Here's a recipe for you:



Ingredients:

1 cup wheat berries (or pearled wheat)

3 tbsp poppy seeds

1/3 cup honey

1/2 cup raisins (or chopped dried fruit)

1/2 cup chopped walnuts
Pinch of salt

Water for hoiling

Cook the Wheat:

Rinse wheat thoroughly.

Boil in 2-3 cups water with a pinch of salt.

Simmer 1.5-2 hours until soft. Drain and cool.

Prepare Poppy Seeds:

Soak poppy seeds in boiling water for 15–20 minutes. Drain and grind using a mortar or food processor until a white liquid appears.

Soften Dried Fruit:

Soak raisins or dried fruit in warm water for 10–15 minutes, then

Combine:

In a large bowl, mix cooked wheat, ground poppy seeds, raisins, walnuts, and honey.

Stir well. Adjust sweetness or moisture with extra honey or a splash of water.

Chill and Serve

My name is Polina and I have written a recipe for traditional borscht. Many Brits already know this wonderful soup, and I think this recipe will be useful. The classic recipe uses beef or pork. I prefer to make red borscht with chicken broth.

Ingredients

For the broth:

- * 1.5-2 liters of water;
- * 400-500 g of beef or pork (chicken).

For the frying:

- * 2 small beets:
- * 1 medium carrot;
- * 3 medium onions;
- * 4-5 tablespoons of vegetable oil;
- * a pinch of citric acid, 1-2 tablespoons vinegar (9%), or the juice of half a lemon;
- * 2 tablespoons of tomato paste.

Remaining ingredients:

- * 300 g of white cabbage;
- * 4 medium potatoes;
- * salt to taste;
- * 1-2 bay leaves;
- * herbs to taste;
- * 1 clove garlic optional;
- * A pinch of ground cloves optional;
- * A pinch ground black pepper optional.

Directions:

Step 1. Cook the meat for 90 minutes in a large saucepan, skimming off any foam occasionally.

Step 2. Prepare the sauté

Wash and peel the beets, carrots, and onions. Grate the beets on a coarse grater and the carrots on a medium grater. Finely dice the onion.

Pour oil into a frying pan and reduce heat to medium. Sauté the onions and carrots, stirring, for about 5 minutes. Then add the tomato paste, stir, and simmer for another 5–7 minutes.

Step 3. Assemble the borscht

Once the broth is cooked, add the shredded cabbage. After 5-10 minutes, add the julienned or diced potatoes. Season with salt to taste. Add the sautéed vegetables and stir.

Step 4. Add the bay leaf and finely chopped herbs. Cover and simmer for another 5-7 minutes.

For a spicier flavor, add some crushed garlic and black pepper. Let the borscht simmer, covered, for 5-10 minutes.

Three years ago, my daughter and I came to the UK, which opened its doors to Ukrainians fleeing the war. Here we received temporary protection. In the first year of our stay, we were taken in by an English family, for which we are very grateful to them and they will forever remain in our hearts. And two years ago, my daughter and I, as well as other Ukrainian families, received support in the form of social housing in a beautiful place - the village of Langtoft. This is a wonderful and safe place for people who have survived the horrors of war and need peace and improvement of their psychological state. Langtoft is a very picturesque village, with beautiful houses, there are many beautiful trees and various flowers near the houses, there is a lot of nature here. The survises and sunsets here are simply incredible, sometimes we take photos of them. There is a very cozy

atmosphere here. Very friendly people live in Langtoft, although we do not communicate much with them due to the language barrier. But we always greet our neighbors and they always have a smile on their faces. As soon as we moved to Langtoft, representatives of the Langtoft community visited us and asked about our needs. We also keep in touch with them on messengers. It is very nice that we were surrounded by such care. We are very grateful for these expressions of attention.

My daughter and I and other Ukrainian families received housing in beautiful new houses in Langtoft, everyone has their own garden near the house, they can decorate it with flowers, and the children have their own space to spend their free time. Our Ukrainian children have integrated well into English society, they study at local schools. Adult Ukrainians find it harder to adapt to another country, but these are the realities of life and we have to accept them. We have to readjust here and change our entire lifestyle for the sake of the safety of our children. We hope that the war in Ukraine will end soon and we will be able to return to our country, where we were happy together with our families and relatives. And now we are infinitely grateful to England, the community of Langtoft, the English people who surround us and support us.

This manifestation of support and humanity from the British will forever remain in our hearts. With great respect and love to the English people,



Being Open to the Message of Hope

As the year turns and the leaves of November fall, we find ourselves in a season of reflection and anticipation. During Remembrance, we pause to honour those who gave their lives in the cause of peace. It is a solemn time — one that reminds us of the cost of conflict and the fragility of our world. Yet, even in the act of remembering loss and sacrifice, we encounter the quiet persistence of hope: the belief that light can emerge from darkness, that compassion and courage endure.

Village History.

The Hydes of Langtoft

Langtoft Hall which once stood where Barn Owl Close is today, was once the home of William Hyde. William was the grandson of a London merchant, Bernard Hyde, whose son Humphrey acquired property and appointments in Lincolnshire and Rutland through marriage.

Humphrey and his wife Sarah gave birth to William in Langtoft on November 10th 1635. He was educated at Queens College Cambridge and in 1658 married Mary, the daughter of Sir John Trollope 1st Baronet of Casewick.

As Sheriff of Rutland, William was responsible for conducting the general election of 1660 and signed the congratulatory address to King Charles II at his restoration. One of the government's first concerns was to re-establish control over the armed forces. The New Model Army was disbanded, and county militias were revived under royal authority. The Lincolnshire Militia in 1660 was part of this national reorganisation and William was appointed a Captain of the Lincolnshire horse militia. The militia served both as a local defence force and as a means of royal control, ensuring order and loyalty in the shires. William was also an active Justice of the Peace from 1660 until his death with responsibilities in Kesteven & Holland.

In 1678 parliament and the nation were alarmed by a fictitious report of a popish plot to assassinate the king and massacre the Protestants to bring about the succession of the Catholic Duke of York (James II). Parliament became completely unmanageable and in 1679 Charles disbanded it after it had sat for 17 years. From about this time the old names of court and country fell out of use and people were distinguished as Tories (King's supporters) and Whigs (opponents).

Three parliaments (known as the exclusion parliaments) met in 1679–1681 and William Hyde together with Sir Richard Cust were Stamford's members for all three. These election results were a blow to Lord Lindsey (Robert Bertie 15th Baron Willoughby de Eresby ;Grimesthorpe Castle) as it saw the rejection of his brothers Charles and Peregine. The election of Hyde and Cust has been attributed to the decision of the Earl of Exeter (John Cecil 5th Lord Burghley) 'virtual proprietor of Stamford to use his influence' against the

Berties. Throughout this period, accession to the throne, Roman Catholic 'aspirations' and fear of another civil war dominated parliamentary business.

In 1682, Lindsey employed his authority as lord lieutenant to dismiss William Hyde from his militia captaincy. Although nominally a Whig, it seems possible that Hyde may have gone over to the court for, following Hyde's dismissal, Lindsey was reprimanded by the King. Sir Leoline Jenkins Secretary of State wrote "by express command of his majesty, to inquire the cause"

In 1683 Hyde went abroad accompanying Lord Exeter as a "gentleman soldier" on one of his many "Grand Tours" through France and Italy. During these tours the Earl was accompanied by much of his household with coaches, wagons and spare horses. He purchased jewellery, statues and paintings many of which are on display today in Burghley House.

Hyde did not stand for parliament in 1685 but was re-elected for Stamford in 1689 and again in 1690. He died on 21st Nov. 1694 and buried in Langtoft. His memorial erected by his daughter-in-law reads:

Sacred to the memory of William Hyde senior who died 21 Nov. 1694 aged 59 years and Mary his wife (elder daughter of Sir Thomas Trollope of Casewick in the county of Lincoln Bar) who died 21 March 1677 aged 35 years by whom he had 3 sons and one daughter. He was the delight of his countrymen honoured with the title of honest¹, chosen frequently to serve in parliament as burgess of Stamford. A Senator most faithful to his God, King and Country.

The Hyde family continued to reside in Langtoft and in 1707, upon the death of Rachell Hyde, a legacy of £50 was bequeathed for the poor parishioners². This sum was used to purchase a small copyhold estate, which was subsequently sold for £450 in 1835, and the proceeds used to buy two houses in Long Sutton producing a rental of about £14. It is recorded that one third of the income was to pay for the education of eight children with the remainder distributed in bread and clothing. Sadly, Rachell had died aged just 14 years and 11 weeks. Her memorial plaque which lies with other Hyde family members beneath the church altar reads:



Rachell the Daughter of Will. and Judith Hyde justly beloved for her sweet temper and admired for her Piety and patience in a lingering Consumption³ of which she Dy'd May the XIth 1707.

At some point during the 18th century the Hydes link with Langtoft ended and in around 1792 the materials of Langtoft Hall were sold off in rooms and the hall demolished. Six generations of the Hyde family continued in Dowsby.

Footnotes:

- ¹ 'honoured with the title of honest' refers to the description of Hyde made by Lord Shaftsbury leader of the Whigs following the elections of 1679.
- 2 The current Trustees of the Rachell Hyde bequest continue to provide gifts to the children of Langtoft school.
- ³ In the 1700's, 'consumption' was the common name for tuberculosis, a bacterial disease that primarily affected the lungs and caused severe weight loss and weakness. It presented as a persistent bloody cough, fever, fatigue, and night sweats, spread through airborne droplets from infected sputum. The disease was highly contagious, and often becoming an epidemic in Western Europe and a major cause of death, especially among young people.

Nature Watch - East End Pond.

We had a very dry spring, which caused the pond to dry out back in May. This meant we lost most, if not all, of this year's newt tadpoles. It's disappointing, but the resilient adult newts will hopefully be back to breed again next spring. Because our groundwater levels are still catching up, the pond itself might not hold any water until mid-November. We'll keep our fingers crossed for rain!



You may have noticed some new additions near the west end of the pond. We planted six fruit trees (apple, pear, and plum) as part of the Coronation Community Orchard initiative. They fought hard and just about survived the hot, dry summer. The big willow trees we cut back last year are looking much tidier, as we've finished pruning their

side branches. We plan to continue "haircuts" for the tops every 2-3 years.

For everyone's safety, we've installed a new depth gauge in the deepest part of the pond. It's just a simple way to provide more warning information to all our visitors.



Our work on the grassland is really paying off for the wildlife. We're seeing a positive burst of wildflowers, with noticeably more Yellow Rattle, Crown Daisy, and Oxeye Daisy now flourishing during summer.

We didn't manage to tempt any swifts into their box this year, but we did have plenty of success with blue tits

raising their broods. On a slightly cheekier note, we have

a very energetic Great Spotted Woodpecker who has apparently decided our bird boxes make for excellent drumming practice (and new holes!).

Nature Watch - Penfield Nature Reserve.

Autumn is upon us which means lots of tidying and pruning activities to do to get the reserve ready for the winter. Even though we had a long hot dry summer the plants and trees at the waters edge, with access to a plentiful water supply have had a mammoth growing season.

Hurricane Amy hit us and we have had a couple of fallen trees to deal with to keep the paths open. Other volunteer activities over the past month have included fence painting, keeping the paths clear of brambles and nettles, scything the long grass and getting the waders out to trim the reeds in the ponds.



We have had some minor vandalism at the reserve, not by human hand, I am pleased to report but a bird. It has taken us a while to fathom out what has been attacking at least 2 of the bird boxes in Penfield and in East End park and why?. We now have video footage of woodpeckers hammering away, to create their own winter roosting sites.

A working party from Perkins in Peterborough have spent a day helping to progress the building of the newt pond. Many thanks to them all for their hard work.

On Friday 16th January 2026, we will be holding our annual presentation evening of wildlife in Penfield. At the same time the prizes for the wildlife photo competitions will be awarded and we have had diverse entries, including a cuckoo, a stonechat and a gecko. Our wildlife photographer reported recently that the bittern had returned to Penfield and promptly attacked one of his cameras.

We look forward to welcoming you to our wonderful school.





